### **Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission and Rivanna River Basin Commission Receive Funding for Assistance to Local Governments for Chesapeake Bay TMDL Planning**

**Charlottesville, VA** – The Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission (TJPDC) and Rivanna River Basin Commission (RRBC) have been awarded a Small Watershed Grants from EPA's Chesapeake Bay Program's to provide assistance to area local governments in developing plans to meet Chesapeake Bay cleanup requirements.

The Chesapeake Bay Small Watershed Grants (SWG) Program provides assistance to organizations and local governments working on a local level to implement projects that improve small watersheds in the Chesapeake Bay basin, while building citizen-based resource stewardship. United States Environmental Protection Agency's (US EPA) Chesapeake Bay Program Office funds this program.

As a part of the comprehensive Bay cleanup and protection program, Virginia is developing Phase II of the Watershed Implementation Plan (WIP) for the Virginia waters that drain to the Chesapeake Bay, including the Rivanna, Tye, Hardware, Rockfish, Rapidan, and South Anna rivers. The Bay cleanup program is referred to as the Bay TMDL (Total Maximum Daily Load, or "pollution diet").

The Phase II plan will provide details about how the Commonwealth will reduce pollution from various sources, such as wastewater, farm fields, and urban stormwater, in order to help bring the Bay into compliance with the Clean Water Act. The Phase II plan will be implemented fully by 2025 in accordance with federal requirements.

Virginia's Department of Conservation and Recreation (VA DCR) is responsible for developing the final Phase II WIP for submittal to US EPA by March 1, 2012. David Johnson, Director of VA DCR, has requested assistance from local governments in the Chesapeake Bay watershed of Virginia in developing the Phase II WIP.

DCR is asking local governments to provide information about potential strategies for improving water quality at the local level, such as retrofitting existing stormwater management facilities, improving sediment controls at construction sites, and developing nutrient management plans for public properties. In addition, localities are also being asked to tell VA DCR the amount of money they will require to implement these strategies.

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TJPDC and RRBC will work together to provide technical assistance, including data compilation and analyses of alternative scenarios, to assist local governments in determining the most cost-effective solutions to achieving Chesapeake Bay clean-up goals while ensuring local water quality protection. Technical assistance will be available to the counties of Albemarle, Fluvanna, Greene, Louisa, and Nelson, and the City of Charlottesville.

TJPDC and RRBC worked together during 2010 on a pilot project supported by EPA and DCR to identify methods for implementing the Bay cleanup efforts with local government involvement. The pilot project identified the need for good local data and diverse stakeholder involvement. Local soil and water conservation districts (Thomas Jefferson SWCD and Culpeper SWCD) will continue to be key partners with local governments in achieving these goals.

Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission (TJPDC) mission is to serve the local governments in Planning District 10 by providing regional vision, collaborative leadership and professional service to develop effective solutions. The RRBC was formed through enabling state legislation in 2004 and consists of elected officials from the governing bodies of Greene, Fluvanna, and Albemarle counties and the City of Charlottesville, as well as board members from the Thomas Jefferson and Culpeper Soil and Water Conservation Districts, and citizen members appointed from each watershed locality.
